New KCV Drugs in Development

TREATMENT of HCV is even more difficult for people with HIV because some of the drugs used to treat HIV may not be used with HCV medications due to drug interactions. However, most people on HIV medications can be switched to other HIV drugs so they can be treated with HCV drugs. But there is good news on the horizon—there are many new drugs being tested that will increase the cure rates of HCV in people who are coinfected with HIV and HCV.

In clinical trials the last step before the approval of drugs is Phase 3 studies. Currently, there are many drugs in Phase 3 studies that include pills that work by stopping HCV from making more copies of itself. If you are interested in a clinical trial, talk to your doctor or nurse.
